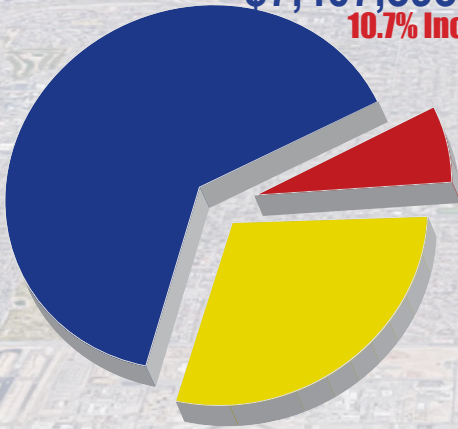

GDP for ABQ Metro (2017)*

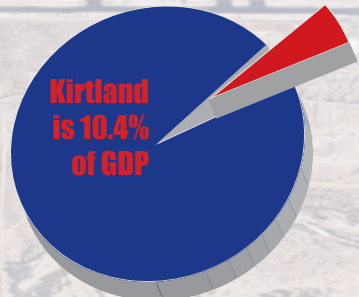
